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A Message from Fr Joseph

On this nineteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time, the Church joyfully reminds us that Jesus our Saviour is always close to us. He calms the storms of our life. Peter was sinking right in front of Jesus, due to fear, his lack of faith and courage. Peter experiences a similar call amidst chaos. We know the story well. The disciples are sent by Jesus in a boat "to the other side." The sea was a dangerous place containing any number of monsters and maniacal manifestations lurking in the deep. They kept to the shallows for safety. Jesus sends them into deeper waters. In the darkest hour of the night's fourth watch, sometime between 3:00-6:00am, a storm swamps the disciples' boat and they are in disarray. It is at that very point, the point when all feels lost and desperate, that Jesus appears, walking on the water. The disciples are so disturbed by their terror that they don't even recognize him -- they are blinded by their fear. It is at that very point, the point when dark spirits have dispelled the light, that Jesus speaks: "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid...Come."

Peter is so moved by this comforting call that he springs out of the safety and stability of the boat onto the unstable and watery terrain of the sea in order to draw near to Jesus.

I imagine Elijah and Peter would have something to say to us today. Here we are, experiencing the storm of this global pandemic that has caused a deep disruption in our lives, especially those who are most heavily impacted by the virus. They may even have something to say to us in the fear that the virus has forced us out of the world as we knew it, into an unknown future. Fear that the dismantling policy, systems, and structures will force many of us out of our boats of privilege and onto an unfamiliar landscape of equity. Fear that our country will continue to provide help for others. But notice when God and Jesus show up and where they stand: amidst the chaos, within moments of confusion.

**Jesus calls out to us today- 'Courage!
It is I! Do not be afraid.'**

REACH!

In that bleak, doubt filled moment as Peter sank into the dark water, with fierce winds blowing and waves crashing around him he would have felt fear, panic, desperation, an overwhelming helplessness.

Amongst those feelings, in those split seconds of starting to sink, his intuitive response was to reach up for what he needed, to be helped, to be rescued, for Jesus to save him...and saved he was by the reaching hand of Christ.

This is a beautiful image for us to remember.



We all have moments in our lives when we feel like we are sinking. We can feel overwhelmed by things at home or work. We can feel anxious about finances/bills/money

or the project or expectations at work. We can feel worried about our loved ones when issues arise or altarcations occur. Maybe even fear that things can't be fixed and they won't get better.

These are the moments we become Peter. We take our eyes off Christ and we lose faith and we start to sink. But how wonderful is it that we know, all we need to do is REACH... reach out for the saving hand of Jesus, to pull us out of the waves of worry and anxiety. We will never know how long Peter was left reaching up before Jesus reached back but we do know that He never let anything happen to him.

And so it is with us, we won't know how long before Jesus grabs us but we know that He eventually will, if **psychologically, spirituality and prayerfully, we just - keep - reaching.**

<p>Mt 14:22-33 - A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew <i>Command me to come to you over the water.</i></p> <p>Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he would send the crowds away. After sending the crowds away he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, while the boat, by now far out on the lake, was battling with a heavy sea, for there was a head-wind. In the fourth watch of the night he went towards them, walking on the lake, and when the disciples saw him walking on the lake they were terrified. 'It is a ghost' they said, and cried out in fear. But at once Jesus called out to them, saying, 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.' It was Peter who answered. 'Lord,' he said 'if it is you, tell me to come to you across the water.' 'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped. The men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.'</p> 

Reflection by Greg Sunter
<p>The cry of Peter is one that each of us feels the need to cry out at some stage in our life. Jesus trusted Peter's ability to walk to him on the water; otherwise he would not have called Peter to do so. It is Peter who doubts himself. In this moment of realising that he can't do it alone, he calls out to Jesus. One of the enduring images of Jesus is as the one who saves – the Saviour. When the realisation eventually comes to each of us that we can't do it all alone, we need only call on the one who saves. Now consider the post-Resurrection encounter of Jesus and the disciples at the Sea of Galilee: Jesus is at the shore, preparing breakfast, and calls out to the disciples. John's Gospel then recounts: <i>Then the disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!" As soon as Simon Peter heard him say, "It is the Lord," he wrapped his outer garment around him (for he had taken it off) and jumped into the water (John 21:7).</i> Have you ever wondered why Peter puts on his clothes <i>before</i> going into the water? Well, when read side by side with today's Gospel, one could assume that on this occasion Peter had faith, and perhaps expected to walk on water when he "jumped in."</p>
