

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saying this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit.
For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

Because the focus of this week's gospel passage is usually placed on poor old doubting Thomas, we sometimes overlook the way the passage begins. The disciples are huddled in a room, 'for fear of the Jews'. Just a couple of weeks earlier they had been on top of the world. Jesus was enormously popular with the people, and the disciples, by association, were caught up in that affection. Their man, the one they had chosen to follow, was making waves and stirring the authorities - thumbing his nose at the rules. This, of course, made the disciples feel good to be around Jesus. However, in the space of just a few short days, their world had turned upside down. They'd gone from riding the crest of a wave to being utterly dumped! They were cowering in a closed up room, afraid for their lives in case those who handed Jesus over for death came for them as well. They'd already had an experience of the resurrected Jesus yet they were still hiding and afraid. Into this fear and uncertainty steps Jesus who says, 'Peace be with you'. It is a reminder of Jesus calming the storm out on the lake - in the midst of turmoil and anxiety he brings peace and calm.

Thomas has received a pretty bad rap for the last 2000 years, forever labelled as 'Doubting Thomas' because he wasn't prepared to take someone else's word for the fact that Jesus had risen. However, despite his demand for evidence, once Jesus is before him, he abandons all his thoughts about placing his fingers in the wounds and proclaims, 'My Lord and my God!' This is an absolutely extraordinary statement of faith. For the very first time, someone recognises Jesus, not as Messiah, prophet or Lord, but as God.

This is a cause of great joy for you, even though you may for short time have to bear being plagued by all sorts of trials; so that, when Jesus Christ is revealed, your faith will have been tested and proved like gold - only it is more precious than gold, which is corruptible even though it bears testing by fire - and then you will have praise and glory and honour. You did not see him, yet you love him; and still without seeing him, you are already filled with a joy so glorious that it cannot be described, because you believe; and you are sure of the end to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls.

HOW TO OBTAIN INDUL-GENCE ON DIVINE MERCY

SUNDAY The decree offers: a plenary indulgence, granted under the usual conditions (sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and prayer for the intentions of Supreme Pontiff) to the faithful who, on the Second Sunday of Easter or Divine Mercy Sunday, in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a

sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honour of Divine Mercy, or who, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!"). Why did the Pope make this decree of a plenary indulgence for special acts of devotion to The Divine Mercy on Divine Mercy Sunday? The decree itself clearly explains that the Holy See wanted to ensure that the faithful could experience the

Mercy of the Lord in a special way on this Feast Day, in the hope that then they might be inspired to be more merciful to others, as God is merciful to us (cf. Lk. 6:36):

CHAPLET OF DIVINE MERCY will be prayed this Sunday after 8am and 10am Masses. This prayer will satisfy one of the conditions for obtaining the Divine Mercy plenary indulgence. The other conditions are reception of the Holy Communion, Sacrament of Reconciliation up to 8 days prior or after the Sunday of Divine Mercy and prayer for the intention of the Holy Father.

DEMPSEY AWARDS the Dempsey Medal is awarded annual by the Archbishop of Sydney to members of the Catholic clergy and laity. The Dempsey medial seeks to encourage and to recognize outstanding contributions and service, it is primarily intended to recognize those who have made an outstanding contribution to their parish. HOW DO WE REMEMBER OUR DECEASED **LOVED ONES** A Christian remembrance differs from the secular one. As Christians we pray for our loved ones or continuing in the Jewish tradition we offer a sacrifice for the forgiveness of sins and salvation of souls of the deceased. The highest form of prayer and sacrifice for our loved ones is the Prayer and the Sacrifice of the Holy Mass, which as members of the Common priesthood we can offer ourselves by attending a Mass or we can ask the priest to offer the Mass (Mass offering) for our loved ones. The difference between the two is that priest acts in "persona Christi", in the person of Christ., so by asking the priest for a Mass Offering we are asking for Christ's prayers and Christ's merits of his Sacrifice rather than our own. However both have great value and the personal prayer and attendance of the Mass should be offered often privately for our deceased loved ones and should also accompany the priest's Mass Offering if we have requested one. Fr. Peter will provide a more thorough explanation on Mass Offerings and Mass Intentions in a booklet which will be available with the Mass Offering envelopes at the back of the church (currently at the entrance to sacristy).
